Strategic Framework

Our Integrated Approach to Mental Health System Strengthening

- Developing comprehensive education programs that directly align with realworld service delivery models, with focus on last mile services for underserved populations
- Conducting rigorous research that informs both practice methodologies and curriculum development, disseminated through small-group conferences, round tables, lectures and symposia, creating an evidence-based feedback loop and policy impact
- Building sustainable capabilities across the mental health ecosystem through multi-stakeholder engagement and implementing targeted social action initiatives, and building and supporting cohorts of changemakers through fellowships to amplify impact and reach

Flagship Academic Initiative

Master of Social Work Program (MSSW Collaboration) - Education Program for System-Level Change

- Developing specialized mental health social work cadre with expertise in marginalized population needs
- Integrating public mental health perspectives into core social work practice
- Implementing practice-based learning methodology with real-world application
- Emphasizing social determinants of mental health in intervention design
- Offer scholarships 18 students FY 2025-26

Ripple effects

- MSW graduates each impact 100+ cases in their first year of practice
- Knowledge transfer to 4-5 junior practitioners per graduate over time

Foundation Programs in Intervention Methods

Diploma Course: Training of Trainers in Open Dialogue: methodology to build Local Trainers in collaborative care approaches (with Dr Pina Ridente & Finnish School of Open Dialogue, Finland)

Diploma Course in Transdisciplinary Research & Practice: for comprehensive problem-solving (in collaboration with VU, Amsterdam)

- Evidence-based intervention techniques with cultural adaptation
- Direct integration with service delivery systems for immediate application

These courses align with The Banyan's responsive care values and enable comprehensive problem-solving through multi-stakeholder engagement and rigorous research approaches - together creating a powerful foundation for culturally congruent, high-impact mental healthcare solutions.

Core Educational Programs

Integrated Center-Aligned Course Structure for Comprehensive Mental Health Care - Specialized Courses with Direct Service Integration:

- Emergency Care & Recovery Centre (ECRC) Crisis intervention, acute care to community re-entry in inpatient psychiatric settings
- Center for Mental Health & Inclusive Development (CMHID) Housing with supportive services focused on community inclusion
- Center for Mental Health and Social Sustainability (CMHSS) Community mental health and support systems
- Child & Adolescent Mental Health (CAMH) Children living with parental mental illness

Core Educational Programs

Multi-Format Delivery System:

- Intensive 6-month diploma programs for frontline staff with hands-on training components 50 students for FY 25-26 (in collaboration with MSSW)
- Structured modules for replication partners with implementation support 50 students for FY 25-26
- UG/PG curriculum integration ensuring academic-practice alignment 50 students for FY 25-26
- Continuous professional development through annual refresher courses 100 students for FY 25-26

Ripple Effects:

- Each ECRC-trained professional handles 30-40 crisis cases annually
- Community mental health workers each reach 150-200 families per year
- Knowledge dissemination through academic integration impacts 50 students annually

Research and Knowledge Creation

Integrated Research Approach:

- Systematic research aligned with four core centers, ensuring practical relevance
- Continuous evidence generation informing course development and updates
- Practice-informed curriculum evolution based on field insights
- Focused investigation of marginalized population needs and effective interventions

Ripple Effects:

- Research findings influence policy decisions affecting 1lakh+ beneficiaries
- Evidence-based practices adopted by 20 partner organizations annually
- Knowledge sharing reaches 50+ mental health organizations through publications

Social Action

Priority Focus Areas:

- Comprehensive support system for Children of Parents with Mental Illness (COPMI) - 100+ children for FY 25-26 under "Scholarships"
- Promotion of mental wellbeing of vulnerable children in Schools, NGO and community settings - 300+ children for FY 25-26 under "Learning Centres"
- Strategic replication partnerships with The Banyan for service expansion
- Systematic advocacy efforts for marginalized community rights and access
- Geographic expansion through carefully selected strategic partnerships
- Development of peer advocacy networks in underserved communities

Ripple Effects:

- Each COPMI support initiative impacts 150-200 families directly
- Partner organizations reach 1,000+ additional beneficiaries annually
- Community advocacy efforts influence policy affecting 1,00,000+ individuals

Fellowships

Three categories: Distinguished fellowship for Mental Health Change Maker(1), Mental Health Advocate (1), Lived Experience Experts/Mental Health Ambassadors (2), Community Mobiliser (1) and Replication Fellowships (2) - 7 Fellowships in total for FY 25-26

- Strategic alignment with replication initiatives across geographies
- Focused development of peer advocacy capabilities and networks
- Geography-specific implementation support systems
- Enhanced representation from diverse socio-economic backgrounds
- Targeted support mechanisms for marginalized community engagement

Ripple Effects:

Each fellow influences implementations reaching 100-10,000 individuals
